



MY HOPE WAS HOPELESS



Okello Tony is one of LICHYGAO beneficiaries. He was imprisoned for 5 years for defilement. He is going to tell us his life story.

My name is Okello Tonny am 22 years now my father is called Mr. Opio Simon and my mother is Ms Margret Abur. Am the 6th born of 9 brothers and a sister. I live in Abolo Village, Teboke Parish, in Chegere Sub County Apac District.


I was studying, but got arrested in 2002 when I was 16 years in S.2 for a relationship with a girl in my school. Life was unpredictable for me during my remand in Atopi prison in Apac. When I was convicted and jailed in 2006, my hope was hopeless. In June 2006, a partner organization to War Child Holland called LICHYGAO with their program "Life Experience" in Lira Central Prison which by then consisted of 40 juveniles helped me a lot. They guided, counseled, taught us new games and we were able to speak our views using different means like drawings, sport, music, dance and drama. Through these activities, a good number of juveniles were rehabilitated morally. After I was released from prison in 2007, I shared my Life Experience with the youth in 12 secondary schools in Lira District in what was referred to as Life Experience Exhibition with LICHYGAO. The main aim of the exhibition was to prevent the youth from getting in conflict with the Law. After, a party was organized by LICHYGAO in our home village to welcome me back from prison. LICHYGAO is paying my school fees in Lira Integrated Secondary School and I am the assistant Head Prefect and in my holidays I work for LICHYGAO as a Volunteer. Life is good in school though I look big in my class, but I have hope. Am happy to share my experience with people. My dream is to become a Doctor.

I would like to thank Adicho Bernard, the Chief Executive Officer of LICHYGAO for what he has done into my life since Prison up to now, I also would like to thank Frank Velthuizen the former Field Location Manager War Child Holland-Lira for his support towards my education and appreciation goes to all the staffs of LICHYGAO and War Child Holland. Special thanks go to my parents, friends and relatives for being close to me during this time of hardship. God Bless you all. Amen

Work of Journalist from the Field

Young Journalists from Coorom Primary School visited the Community Liaison Officer (CLO) Mr. Jodaga Gemunamolo in his office in Lira Town. They had a very interesting interview with the officer about sexual exploitation of young children.



Journalist: What is your role as the CLO?

Officer: My primary role is to link the activities between the Police and the community. I also sensitize the community and educate them about crime and how to protect themselves against crime. As a Policeman my role is to enforce law and order and protect property and life of people.

Journalist: Sir, how does your office help children who are sexually abused?

Officer: My office ensures that the rights of the children are protected. Children should not be sexually abused. When a child is sexually abused, the first step is to take that child to the hospital for medical examination and treatment. Register the case with Police, investigate, arrest the suspect and produce him to court. We also counsel the child who has been sexually abused. It is the court to award punishment to the culprit according to the evidence produce.

Journalist: Are there government policies that help to protect children from the above act?

Officer: Yes. Government policies on children are prescribed in the Children's Act and also contained in the constitution of Uganda. It observes that a child is one who is below the age 18 and should be provided with basic necessities like food, shelter, medical attention, clothing and parental care.

Journalist: How many cases of child abuse have you registered in 2008?

Officer: Cases come after the end of every month and there figures varies but I can't tell exactly because others are registered at central police station and very many are registered at the police posts which are scattered all over the

District. About 30 cases are registered every month ranging from defilement, rape, assault and neglect. However, there are cases which may not be reported. When this happens and it comes to police notice, investigation are made, arrest effected and charges made. For example if it is defilement, charge the persons with defilement and the other person who had not reported the defilement with concealment of defilement (*Procurement of Defilement*)

Journalist: What challenges does your office meet in handling cases on sexual abuse of children?

Officer: There is lack of personnel, apparatus and machines for handling sexual abuse. Example NO Police Doctors and since the police use referral system, private doctors have to be hired and they are not easily available. There is also scarcity of transport making it hard to move to villages where cases have been reported and identified.

Journalist: What measures has your office employed to curb down the above challenges?

Officer: The police usually refer the victims for medical examination to the health authority. We also work with NGOs like UNICEF, Save The Children and War Child Holland to solve transport problems since their activities are scattered all over the District

Journalist: How does your office handle cases of soldiers and police officers reported in sexual abuse, neglect and exploitation of children?

Officer: Nobody is above the law.

Journalist: Has your office encountered a problem like this?

Officer: No.

Journalist: What message and advice does your office have for children, parents, perpetrators, schools and the community at large about sexual abuse and exploitation of children?

Officer: We should join hands together to protect children. We should encourage children to take up their responsibilities so as to cope up with life and they should do so as is prescribed in the children's right. Young children should abstain from sex in order to continue with school because they can't serve two masters at ago. They should also refrain from getting married at an early stage in order to create a healthy environment for them (children) to live in. Parents should provide their children with all the basic necessities ranging from school fees, food, shelter, clothing and parental care because they are the future leaders of Uganda. The perpetrators will be arrested and brought to books of Law. But they should as well change their behaviors and altitude towards children.





#### "RAISING VOICES CORNER"

Raising Voices works to prevent violence against children at home, in school and in the community in Uganda. We have talked to many children and adults in Uganda about violence against children. In this section of the magazine, we would like to share with you what they said to us.

#### **Economic violence**

Hello Children, welcome to the third part of the *Preventing Violence Against Children Forum*. This time we will be looking at economic violence. If you can remember, in the last forum we were talking about emotional violence, what it is, who experiences it and how it happens. We saw that emotional violence is any act in which the adult intentionally attacks the feelings of the child to make them feel bad, such as saying harsh words to them, insulting the, threatening the, shouting or looking at them with bad eyes to make children feel bad.





Children have shared with us stories of their experiences of violence. Just like in the previous issue, we continue sharing with you these stories. The name of these children have been changed to protect them, but the stories they share with us happened to children in real life. As you read about these children stores, think about yourself. #### Voices on Violence Economic Violence

"Can you imagine how rich I would be even if I were paid a few shillings for all the work I do right now?" Rebecca asked her friend. "I wake up early and have to sweep the compound and then fetch water and then cook porridge for everyone. When I come back from school. I have to wash clothes, pound cassava, help with cooking supper and then wash plates. I am so tired by the time t go to sleep."

"Stopdreaming," herfriendsaid, shaking herasifshewas as leep. "Instead of payment, my uncle says he will refuse to pay for my uniform and shoes if he thinks I am not behaving well. Since my mother died, he has taken over our house and all the property and says it is his now. Children, he says, don't know anything about money so now that my parents are dead, its all his."


"My father says." Rebecca added, "I will fetch a good bride-price when the right man conies along, and

it will make him a rich man. But until then I should work hard at home to contribute towards the family."

Do you think children should have to work so hard to have their basic needs provided?" her friend asked. Rebecca thought about it for a while than said, "every one should make a contribution to their family according to their ability, but children are sometimes asked to contribute too much. I wish 1 could tell him that 1 am so tired and can't concentrate at school and all the work hurts my body. My back hurts all the time from carrying heavy loads or my young sister.

"Why do you think adults make children work so hard?" her friend asked her. Rebecca thought about it for a while and then said, "only they can answer that. Maybe its because they think children are an investment, not real human beings. Maybe they do it because they can. Alter all, who going to stop them?"


In a study completed recently, almost 30 percent of the children consulted said they experience economic violence at least once a week. More than one in three children said that they had been denied food or basic need as a form of punishment and almost 50 percent said they were over worked in their family.
















## 'Acanacana Game"




# ( How to play "Acanacana" gam

Warm greetings, good luck with studies and till we meet again?


